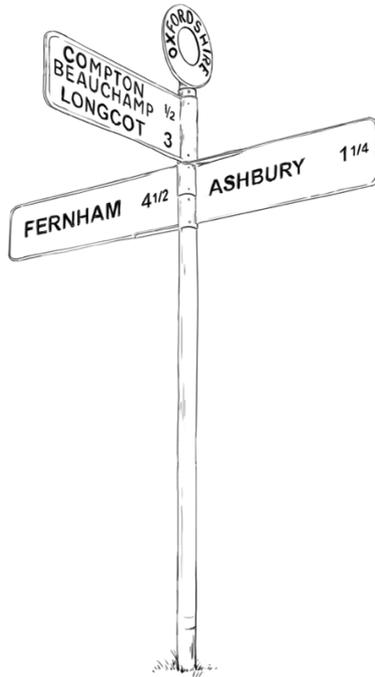

Thought for the month

As Richard Fergusson suggested in his thought piece last month, it seems virtually inconceivable that we are currently experiencing yet another war in Europe. I feel particularly sad about the situation in Ukraine having previously worked in Kyiv on behalf of the EU's Eastern Partnership arrangements. Ukraine is a young democracy, but I found the people wonderfully open-minded and determined to make a success of their new-found freedoms. Kyiv is also a beautiful city having been completely rebuilt after the ravages of the Second World War. Perhaps its crown jewels are the Orthodox churches and, whilst many of them in Kyiv have survived relatively intact so far, the same cannot be said in other parts of the country where cities like Mariupol and Bucha have been laid to waste with the inevitable human toll.

The only positive side to this humanitarian tragedy has been the response of ordinary people in countries such as Poland and Romania who have welcomed Ukrainian refugees with open arms. As a nation we have also shown enormous generosity both financially and in terms of our time, collecting clothes and consumables, and then transporting them to the Polish-Ukrainian border. It has been a wonderful display of charity in action. And even if we were to set aside our Christian values as reasons for assisting Ukraine, there are also strong realpolitik reasons for doing so. After Putin's interventions in Georgia in 2008, Crimea and the Donbas region in 2014 and now the entirety of Ukraine, where next? Even as I write this article, a senior Russian General has suggested Moldova. Whilst various analysts argue that this is unlikely, the same analysts suggested in mid-February that a Russian incursion into Ukraine was also unlikely. I therefore believe that we must continue to do all in our power and in our own ways to support Ukraine and its people in their time of need.

Whilst it is entirely appropriate that our thoughts are dominated by events in Ukraine, we should not lose sight of events nearer to home, with the celebration of the 70th Anniversary of HM The Queen's Accession. Villages around the Vale are busy planning the lighting of beacons, organising street lunches and pageants, and the planting of trees. I hope that we will celebrate this amazing anniversary with our usual gusto and verve, but perhaps this year we might also display some Ukrainian flags amongst the Union Jacks?

Clarinet Collective concert on Saturday 21st May at 6.30 pm in St. Mary's church, Longcot. The Clarinet Collective is delighted to be giving another concert in St. Mary's church, Longcot on Saturday 21st May. The concert will start at 6.30 pm and there will be a bar for drinks from 6 pm. The theme is 'Rose, Leek, Thistle and Shamrock' and the programme will include music from all four parts of the UK, in celebration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. There will be works by English composers through the ages, from Byrd and Purcell to Vaughan Williams and Elgar, also some twentieth century pieces inspired by Celtic and English folk music. Country Matters

We have this black working cocker spaniel called Flo. Since marrying, and it's forty-nine years now, we have always had a dog. The first was a springer spaniel called Flop. One of her skills was hunting down cockroaches that scattered when we switched on the lights in the kitchen returning from the pub in our first year at Rectory Farm! The cockroaches are long gone. Then came a border terrier cross called Flick. I ran over her once; I think she was squatting to spend a penny under the landrover wheel but she bounced back after a few days, she was so tough.

Fun next, a golden Labrador which was to be a proper shooting man's dog but despite expensive training she was wayward and was nicknamed Porsche because of her speed. Our last two have been cockers. Preceding Flo was Crumpet, dearly loved by Penny and me, very active and a pretty blue roan. She came with that name but all the four others have started with the letter F!

Cockers are bred to hunt and retrieve but in training they respond better to being bidden rather than any form of coercion. They, perhaps more than any other breed rarely seem to tire, even on a long day. Leaving them alone all day is not good for this breed.

Flo, now ten, does the rounds through the bushes of our garden every morning at our present home Glebe Cottage, Bishopstone. If she starts barking it's a hedgehog and she has found two. Recently she kept returning silently to a lonicera bush and there was a well fleshed youngish, but dead dog fox. Poisoning could have been the reason but I hasten to add not by us. This week in another bush she was again silently immovable with her nose down a small hole and I think the most likely candidate is a rat.

A few neighbours' cats patrol which occasionally causes some excitement. Mostly walled, rabbits have so far escaped us but I have taught her not to chase them and she is also very steady off a lead with sheep.

During the dark days of lockdown both a male and female green woodpecker were viewed close up through our low sitting room window as they dug their formidable beaks into our lawn. The green and red, and contrast in colouring between the sexes was very interesting. They stayed some time before being disturbed by jackdaws. Blackbirds and pigeons dominate but quite often we see a song thrush and some years I can find their nest and lovely blue eggs.
