

Thought for the month

The Bible Previously, I urged you to read the Bible to find out for yourselves the truth about God. God is Truth..... and truth is absolute.... This means that something is true whether or not we choose to acknowledge it. Believing and Trusting in God is the most important thing anyone can do, hence why I'm so passionate about warning everyone about the consequences of ignoring God.

After my June entry I felt compelled to try to visit every house in the parish to offer a free copy of the Bible, so you have the means of reading it. So far, I have visited about 150 homes and more than 35 people accepted a copy. (If I've not seen you, it's either because you were out, hiding(!?) or because I haven't got to your home yet!). I mention this, not for self-aggrandisement, but to encourage those who have taken a copy to read it and so they know they are not alone. It is a powerful book, but it is not a talisman, it is only beneficial if you actually read it and seek to learn from it! Many people turned down the offer because they already had a copy...... Sadly, the majority also admitted that they seldom or ever looked at it! (I thank everyone for the warm reception I received it was good to chat with old friend and meet new ones) While agonising about what to write this month I found a quotation by J.C. Ryle, (who was Bishop of Liverpool in the mid 1800's.) which I thought rang true:

"Be very sure of this – People never reject the Bible because they cannot understand it. They understand it too well;

They understand that it condemns their own behaviour;

They understand that it witnesses against their own sins, and summons them to judgement.

They try to believe it is false and useless, because they don't like to believe it is true!"

It is true that the bible does, condemn and convict us of sin, and warns of the judgement...... It says every one of us is a sinner, deserving of punishment and there is nothing that we, ourselves, can do about it......But it doesn't stop there....... It goes on to describe God's love for us and how, because of His love, He provided the only possible solution, which was to send His Son, Jesus, to live the only ever perfect life, so He could die in our place and take the punishment which we deserved. The bible tells us that Jesus will return to take his followers to be with him and to judge the world. Nobody knows when that will be, but one thing I know for sure, is

that every day it is getting closer so don't delay. The bible prophesies that as His return approaches there will be wars and rumours of wars...... But don't be distracted by the wars and rumours of wars...... The real war is for your eternal soul!

Many of you will be aware that Norma Fergusson, our Vicar, is retiring on May 19th next year. She and her husband Richard have been well known and much appreciated in their commitment to serving all the parishes across our benefice and we shall mark this and their retirement next spring.

We are now beginning to look to the future and are undertaking a wide consultation process. The process is being led for us by the Reverend Canon Charles Chadwick, Parish Development Adviser for the Dorchester Archdeaconry and Mission Department Lead for the Rural church.

Since a third of the paper is not recycled in the UK, most cards end up in landfill where they can take years to decompose. Emissions produced in the manufacturing and delivery processes are also a significant factor.

Perhaps this year we can cut down on the Christmas cards we send. Do we really need to send Christmas cards to everyone we know? Perhaps a phone call to people we haven't spoken to for a while, or a newsy email, would be much nicer and more environmentally friendly. Another alternative is to send up-cycled Christmas cards.

Locally, if you would like to send a card to friends in Ashbury, Kingstone Winslow and/or Idstone, how about hanging one card, with a message to all your friends and neighbours, on the 'Christmas Card Tree' in St Mary's Church or in the Rose and

Crown? It is estimated that approximately 1 billion Christmas cards are thrown away in the UK each year, let's do our bit to reduce this number and save the trees.

From the Oxford Journal 16th November 1776

On Monday last died, in the 26th Year of his Age, the Reverend George Wigan, D. D. Rector of Old-Swinford in Worcestershire, and Ashbury in Berkshire; both which Preserments he enjoyed stry-four Years. He was sormerly a Student, and an eminent Tutor of Christ-Church; and afterwards Principal of New-Inn-Hall, in this University: The Degree of Doctor in Divinity was conferred upon him, by Diploma, at the Opening of the Radelivian Library, by the Recommendation of the late Earl of Oxford, one of Dr. Radeliste's Trustees.

Concert by the Torriano Ensemble in St. Mary's Church, Longcot

On Sunday 19th November at 6 pm the Torriano Ensemble is delighted to be returning to St. Mary's Church, Longcot for an evening of music for flute, clarinet, bassoon, horn and string quintet.

The programme features two much-loved masterpieces from the classical period, Mozart's charming and effortlessly melodious Flute Quartet in D major K. 285 and the magnificent Octet by Schubert. It is thought that Schubert heard Beethoven's Septet and was inspired to write a similar work of his own, and indeed there are many similarities of structure and style between the two pieces.

Arrangements of three of Gershwin's most popular songs, 'Embraceable You', 'The Man I Love' and 'I've Got Rhythm', provide a contrast of style and mood.

Country Matters

Roger Evans is a retired Welsh dairy farmer who writes every Saturday for Western Daily Press. Roger tells a good story. His wife makes him a chicken curry. He eats the rice and curry sauce and finds himself pushing the small pieces of chicken around because the taste is different. They find the packaging from the bin and discover the "chicken" is made from plants. His left overs are deposited up the garden for the birds and cats. A week later they notice only the "chicken" pieces are left.

With the radio whilst driving, I was listening to an interview in a studio with a dog owner who claimed that his dog had decided to save the planet and eschew meat in favour of a vegan diet. The dog was present in the studio but seemed unable to express himself as convincingly as his master.

We are beef producers. Our neighbour, Helen Browning at Eastbrook farm is an organic dairy, beef, pork, and lamb producer. Quite obviously, the rise of veganism is not good for producers like us. It's a free country still so what we eat and what we choose for our diets is down to the individual but it's a shame that some vegan zealots have crossed the line and made threats to stock farmers. Farmers are always uneasy with these campaigners when they have large stocks of vulnerable straw that could be torched as arson.

Maybe, the rise of veganism has stalled. It was reported last week that Marlow Foods, the parent company of Quorn has crashed on lower sales and cost inflation. Quorn has a tie up with KFC selling vegan burgers. Quorn's problems have been shared with the Yorkshire based sausage firm Heck which has pulled its vegan products. Meatless farm is another that is in administration. Nevertheless, the RSPCA trustees have voted for 100% plant- based products at its functions yet benefits hugely but now with hypocrisy from its bespoke assurance schemes for livestock. By the time you read this the world rugby might be over but I doubt many of the players are vegan. And what would happen to England's green and pleasant pastures, with their role in capturing carbon without grazing livestock?
